Event Materials Box

Rachel's Challenge Banner

Similar to the Rachel's Challenge banner for the entire school, the FOR Club banner can be signed by members of the FOR Club as a sign of their further commitment to the club and taking specific actions to create a more positive school environment.

> FOR Club Coaching

Access to an RC FOR Club Coach, who will assist you in sustaining the momentum from the impact of Rachel's story and the full event day on your school community.



Technical Requirements

Please provide the following to ensure effective audio, video, and lighting components on your program day.

Presentation Venue

An auditorium is ideal and preferred for all presentations (except FOR Training, however the training can still take place in the auditorium). Otherwise a gymnasium will work for all programs.

Technical Assistant

Please have a Technical Assistant ready to meet the RC Certified Presenter one hour before the program start time to help setup for the event, including audio, video, and lighting.

Sound System

A sound system with at least two inputs capable of microphone and computer audio, loud enough to fill an auditorium or gym. Presenter's laptop can be connected via a second XLR/ microphone cable.

Microphone (+ XLR Cable if necessary)

Please have one microphone, wireless or wired preferred. A lapel mic is OK if it's the only option. If using a wired mic, please also provide an XLR cable to connect to the sound system. Wireless only for Link Up! Elementary presentation.

Backup LCD Projector

Please provide a backup LCD projector. The RC Certified Presenter will bring their own to use, so this will only serve as backup if needed. *Please note:* The projector should be able to connect via VGA or HDMI to the presenter's laptop, which is at the front of the room with the presenter.

Screen

A minimum 10 x 10 ft. screen is necessary for the program. Larger = better.

Rachel's Challenge

RC Live FAQ:

- 1. Can we host the event in a different location other than an auditorium or gymnasium?
 - a. Yes. Auditoriums and gyms are typically the best venues to accommodate for the students and tech requirements, but any space that can fulfill these requirements will work.
- 2. Do your programs have closed captioning for any hearing impaired students and staff?
 - a. Yes, all programs have closed captioning on the videos.
- 3. How long is the program?
 - a. Elementary Link Up! = 40 minutes
 - b. Rachel's Story, Rachel's Challenge, Rachel's Legacy, and Keynote = 60 minutes
 - c. FOR Training = 90 minutes
 - d. Elementary Educator Training = 3 hours
- 4. Can we shorten the program?
 - a. No.
- 5. Does the Elementary Link Up! presentation discuss the Columbine tragedy?
 - a. No. The Elementary Link Up! presentation does not mention the Columbine tragedy at all and focuses on the positive impact of Rachel's life and writings.
- 6. Does the Rachel's Story presentation discuss the Columbine tragedy?
 - a. Yes. It is presented in an age-appropriate manner through the perspective of some of Rachel's family members, including her younger brother, Mike, who was in middle school at the time of the tragedy.
- 7. Our school is Kindergarten 6th grade. Which programs would you recommend?
 - a. The Elementary Link Up! is most appropriate for K-5th grade. In elementary schools that also include 6th grade, we recommend one Elementary Link Up! Presentation for K-4th grade and one Rachel's Story presentation for 5th - 6th grades.
- 8. Can we preview any of the programs? Specifically the content around the Columbine tragedy?
 - a. Unfortunately it is not possible to preview any of the videos in our live programs. The opening videos of each presentation (besides Elementary) do include scenes from local TV news footage of the Columbine tragedy, and each is presented at a level appropriate to each age group.



- 9. Can we remove the opening video about Columbine and only show the rest of the presentation?
 - No. Rachel's story cannot be told without discussing the tragedy of her death.
 However, the majority of the program focuses on the positive impact of Rachel's life on the people around her.
- 10. Do you have any programs in Spanish or Spanish subtitles?
 - a. Rachel's Story, Rachel's Challenge, Rachel's Legacy, Community Event, and Keynote all have Spanish subtitles.
- 11. Which students should be in the FOR Training?
 - a. We recommend a good cross-section of the student body. A good option is to allow students to sign-up to participate in the training either before the event day or after seeing the presentation. The latter option gives students who are moved by Rachel's story and want to continue Rachel's chain reaction of kindness and compassion. If pre-selecting students, we encourage including traditional student leaders as well as non-traditional students. Everyone can benefit.
- 12. Is 30 minutes necessary in-between programs?
 - a. 30 minutes is preferred to allow enough time for students to transfer in and out of the venue, as well as give the presenter a short break. If necessary the time can be shortened, but a minimum of 15 minutes is required.
- 13. How do you recommend scheduling an event day?
 - a. One or two presentations in the morning, followed by the FOR Training after lunches (middle school & high school only). The FOR Training and any students who participate should have seen one of the presentations prior to attending the training.
- 14. Can I get the contact information for our presenter?
 - Out of respect for our presenters we do not give out their personal contact information. The presenter will contact you at least two days prior to your event day.
- 15. How should the presenter be introduced?
 - a. We prefer to focus on Rachel's story and not the presenter. Therefore a simple introduction such as, "Please welcome ______ from Rachel's Challenge," is great!
- 16. Can we request a certain presenter?
 - a. Yes, however there is a fee to book a specific presenter. Please inquire with a rep. Otherwise we will do our best to fulfill your request depending on availability.
- 17. Can we record the program?
 - a. No. Rachel's Challenge programs are protected by copyright.
